## MANAGER'S KORNER

Hopefully you are reading this article sitting in your lounge chair with the sun beating down on your body thawing out your insides from the recent cold weather we had to fight off. When that sun comes out it almost seems like it was never cold here unless you are visiting from the northern tundra.

As always we continue to work throughout the park on the general daily maintenance items as well as continuing with the preventative maintenance programs.

We have recently cut down a few damaged palm trees in the neighborhood and will be getting a few others evaluated within the next month or so prior to doing our usual trimming of all the palms, which is usually in April.

If you would like a palm replaced please notify the office and we will add to the schedule during planting season.

The warm weather projects are building up with the perimeter fence cleaning and overhanging tree branch trimming being the major ones. We will be trying to get the entire fence line done for all the overgrown shrubbery and trees before the heat of summer takes over.

We will be lighting up and landscaping the North Gate entrance/exit shortly. (within the next 2 weeks).

A request has gone to the police department thru the City of Tarpon to authorize "HIDDEN DRIVEWAY" signs along Mango Street to further protect our residents using the North Gate.

The new camera system has been installed at the North Gate. This system is far more advanced than the one that never seemed to work there prior and costs the same amount. Let's hope we never have to use it.

Thank you for your cooperation during the shutdown of the wells, they have been turned on for the past 2 weeks and will remain on until further notice. We conserved over 1.8 million gallons of water during the 2 week shutdown.

Please remember to check out the landscape article for helpful hints and general information to help you have a healthy lawn and colorful yard throughout the year.

New enclosed bulletin boards have been ordered to replace the ones at the front of the Clubhouse, the mail area and an additional one will be going up by the pool area.

We have purchased a new work golf cart and are waiting for it to be completed. It's a heavy duty (48 volt as compared to the 36 volt residential ones). We have traded in the 2 broken down ones for a \$1,100 credit.

Phone books for 2011 will be out shortly, you will be notified when available.

Remember the Annual meeting date is March 16 and since the membership is voting on some proposed new rules we will be printing new Rules and Regulations booklets as well shortly. **IMPORTANT: PLEASE VOTE** – The proposed amendment to the Master Occupancy Agreement needs a 75% favorable vote to pass to have your share interest protected. That's 199 YES votes. **PLEASE VOTE.**

Real estate has picked up nicely so far with 2 homes sold and 2 contracts pending (CP) in the first 2 months of 2011. There have been plenty of inquiries as well. At one point last year the park had 24 homes for sale, there are 16 as of today. (All prices include the \$35,000 share)

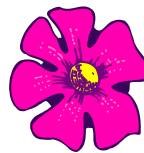

## RECIPES

Spring is almost here. I know that because I was born on March 20, 1936 – worse blizzard West Virginia had seen in years. The doctor had an awful time getting to the house. Couldn't see very well, he announced me as a boy. There's your laugh for the day.

My late husband Eugene loved Potato Pancakes. I made these a lot for us. May serve with Applesauce or Sour Cream.

### POTATO PANCAKES

½ Cup Vegetable Oil  
1 teaspoon Salt  
Little Black Pepper  
2 Large Eggs  
4 Cups Refrigerated Shredded Hash Browns  
2 Green Onions Thinly Sliced

Preheat oven to 250°. Line cookie sheet with paper towels. In a 12 inch skillet, heat oil until hot. Meanwhile prepare pancakes, in a bowl, mix salt, pepper, eggs, stir in potatoes and green onions. Drop mixture by ½ cup into hot oil to make 4 pancakes flatten each one little. Cook 7 minutes until golden brown on both sides. Transfer cakes to paper towel lined sheet, keep warm in oven while doing remainder of mixture.

Hope that you enjoy this treat, so different, so good.

### SWEET POTATO POUND CAKE

3 Cups All Purpose Flour  
1 teaspoons Baking Powder  
2 teaspoons Ground Cinnamon  
1 teaspoon Ground Nutmeg  
½ teaspoon Baking Soda  
¼ teaspoon Salt  
2 Sticks Unsalted Butter Softened  
1 ½ Cups Sugar  
½ Cup Packed Brown Sugar  
1 teaspoon Vanilla  
2 Cups Mashed Sweet Potatoes  
4 Large Eggs (Room Temperature)  
¾ Cup Chopped Pecans

Heat oven to 325°. Grease two 9 inch loaf pans with spray. In medium bowl, mix next 6 ingredients.

In a large bowl, cream butter, sugars and vanilla until fluffy. Blend in sweet potatoes, eggs one at a time, on low speed mix in flour mixture in 3rds. Mix just enough to blend. Spoon batter into pans. Sprinkle with chopped pecans. Bake 70 to 80 minutes. Cool on rack 15 to 20 minutes before moving from pans. Enjoy. Love and Best dishes from Lois Bauer.

## THE LANDSCAPE ARTICLE

the landscape guy

AHHHH!! Welcome to the best time of the year, Spring is springin' and soon it will be sprung. Sunshine and warm weather brings just about anything you can imagine, new shoots of green grass, colorful new growth on bushes and shrubs, and soon to follow beautiful colorful flowers along with plenty of bugs and weeds. Sorry, that's just the facts.

If the proper applications of weed killer and fertilizer were applied during the winter months the nuisance pests and weeds will be kept at a minimum but do not expect to get rid of the trillions that exist in the lawns.

This is where every homeowner can not only enjoy the blooms of the season but can help tremendously by keeping an eye out for any unusual and odd happenings around the yard.

We are not the only ones that enjoy new fresh green sprouts of grass and colorful flowers, the pests are madly in love with them as well. New growth is fresh food for many bugs and the warm weather means that they look for shelter to raise the millions of their young who also enjoy the new fresh growth of spring.

Along with the pests enjoying the new growth you also have to watch out for disease on your lawn and plants.

The best way to combat against the onslaught of the new season is to use a general pesticide (for bugs) and disease (for fungus) spray on your shrubs and flowers before they get invaded. Pests can destroy a plant in days, if untreated, so best to not even give them a chance to start.

Do not be scared by all the problems that your plants may have. There are very simple solutions. Very simple.

### PESTS AND DISEASE:

General pesticides and disease (sometimes called fungus) control products can be purchased at any home improvement store or nursery. Ortho, Spectracide, Seven, and Bayer are some of the trusted brand names that work. Purchase a product that controls both and one that you have to mix yourself, the pre-mixed products tend to be less potent. But if you have no choice, then purchase the pre-mixed. DO NOT PURCHASE A FERTILIZER/ PEST CONTROL MIX. They tend to be mostly fertilizer and will damage the plant if over sprayed. Overspray of a pesticide or disease control will not damage the plant. Make sure that you coat the plant thoroughly above and below, many pests love to shade themselves and feed on the underside of the leaves. A simple hand held pump sprayer (usually comes in a one quart style) will do the trick and it's not too heavy to lug around the yard.

The most common things to look for that are signs of pests on plants are the curling of leaves and/or small white spots on the leaf, signs on flowers especially on

the top new growth and on the buds are small discolored specs. Again any one of the above mentioned products will work. Common disease (fungus) markings are black or dark sticky spots or a white powdery substance on the leaf.

### **LAWNS:**

Same principals hold true with your lawns with regard to needing additional help during the grow season. The Park sprays for pests and weeds every 60 days, but some of the heavy rains that we experience in Florida can dilute those helpful chemicals and they can use a boost in the off months. You do not need to spend much for this to be accomplished. Do not worry about fertilizer as much as a pesticide (bugs) and disease (fungicide) control. A simple product that connects to your hose or a granular in a spreader will do the trick 2 or 3 times a year (a \$25-\$40 total investment). You will be surprised with the results.

**REMINDER: DO NOT USE COMBINATION FERTILIZER AND WEED CONTROL.**

If you must use a weed control remember to read the instructions for coverage. Too much can kill your lawn, but an important note is if you have a healthy lawn it will starve off weeds trying to grow.

The most common things to look for in your lawns are light tan colored areas that get bigger on a daily basis as well as yellowing areas.

While you are enjoying your yard look for the above signs and treat accordingly.
