January 2020 Landscape Article

Hello Everyone,

It is the time of the year again – you might have guessed it, I am not only referring to the Holidays. I am writing to remind you to skip a week of irrigation during the cooler months of December, January and February.

According to the University of Florida, grass doesn't need to be watered as often during the cooler months. In fact, this time of the year,

St. Augustinegrass only needs one-half to three quarters of an inch of irrigation-water every 10-

14 days.

Overwatering does not only waste water it also can encourage pests and diseases in the landscape. Skipping a week of watering is as easy as 'off' for community associations and residents with irrigation timers. Turn the timer to 'off' for the week that you want to skip, and 'on' for the week that you want to water,"

You can determine when your grass needs water when

- Grass blades are folded in half lengthwise.
- Grass appears blue-gray in color.
- Footprints remain on the lawn for several minutes after walking on it.

Watering only every other week or less during the winter will not only improve landscape health, it will also help to conserve drinking water and protect our resources. Therefore start "skipping" today and spread the word among your friends, neighbors and clients.





A TALE FROM THE SOUTH PACIFIC (PART TWO)



When last we reported, we left you in Fiji. Since then, we have done thirteen ports, in the countries of Vanuatu, Tonga, Cooks Island, and French Polynesia. We have done a variety of typical tourist activities.

My snorkelling adventures and misadventures have been memorable. Almost every island has phenomenal snorkelling with views of beautiful coral and a myriad of gorgeous fish species. While I did my snorkelling endeavours in the Pacific, Owen searched for the perfect photo of birds, flowers, and any other unique sight he could find. One time he joined up with two friends and took a tour into the country to discover scenery and life in the villages. Another time he actually joined me in the shallows in order to cool off. The last time I swam with the fish, we watched sharks nearby right at the shoreline! Never fear. These are docile reef shark. Whenever we have been able, we take off by ourselves and take a walking tour. What a marvellous time we have had talking to the locals and discovering their lifestyles. At other times, we joined up with friends we have made on the ship and hired a driver/guide. With them we have enjoyed the most amazing scenery and ways of life. We typically take off as soon as the ship clears customs so we can tour in the morning. The heat and humidity is quite daunting leaving us exhausted!

No two ports are exactly alike; however, there are many similarities. Tourism is a very important industry in all of these islands. Some are very sophisticated and up to date in their offerings, others very primitive but most authentic! Other dominating industries are based on agriculture (bananas, coconut, lim- ited pineapple to name some), pearls (black Tahitian), textiles (sarongs for women and some for men everywhere!) copra (dried coconut meat pressed for its oil). Religion is a vital part of everyday life in the South Pacific. There is evidence of the ancient religions and beliefs practiced before the Europeans came

to this part of the world. Almost every port had a group at the pier doing the native dances to the chants of traditional singing and instrumental accompaniment. Cannibalism was practiced as a way to deal with the enemy and to take on the power of the defeated. Since the head is the source of power, that body part was reserved for the chief. Today the Protestant faith is the dominant one, followed by Catholicism, Mormonism. The Seventh Day Adventist and Jehovah's Witnesses also have followers on some islands. The scenery is awe-inspiring on every island. The islands that make the most impact are those developed by volcanoes. Their skylines for the sail ins are overwhelming. Their botanical gardens and those at individual's homes are all worthy of photography. Waterfalls and other features of the mountain valleys are lovely.

In the towns and villages, housing is basic by our standards, but well built and not trashy. In the smaller villages, there is cottage industry with the textiles, art work and jewelry being offered for sale at the home or in a small addition to the home. Most villagers have a fisherman in the home with the catch intended for the family's use. Village homes also have a vegetable garden and fruit trees. Most families have a pig or two, many chickens, and a dog or two. Almost all places have a market. Some are just a few stalls at the pier, but most are larger and intended for the locals as well as the tourists. In the cities, the farm produce and the fish are quite a colourful sight.

These islanders all share a strong commitment to family, and a respect for ancestry, religion and cultural traditions. The approach to life is emphasis on what can I give away, not what can I accumulate. No wonder the Americans had little success offering money in return for working the plantations in recent centuries: There was no knowledge of money at that time and the people felt they had everything they needed with no need to buy anything! Want more? We would love to share our photos and further chats about our trip. Just let us know!

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
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
