MAY 2021

When I was living in NY and working on Wall Street, we used to have a group of 20 of us that would run a bass fishing tournament just outside of Monticello, NY, about a 2-hour trip from Manhattan. The place we held the tournament was called Eldred Preserve. It was a 2500-acre estate with a beautiful picture-perfect lake on it owned by the man who had something to do with the development of the spray nozzle for aerosol cans. Small world. The lake was for electric motors only – to keep the area pristine.

There were 10 small aluminum boats available (2 people per boat) on the lake which we ran the tournament on. Now you have to remember, we were all Wall Street so called "hot shots" big cash, expense account stuff dummies. When we had the chance to let loose, we did in a big way. Fishing poles were almost as important as booze on these fishing excursions.

The winner of our bass fishing tournament after 5 weekend rounds of fishing was entered into the year-end tournament run by Bass Masters where the grand prize was a \$17,000 fishing boat. My partner on each trip was a great friend, Vinny Quentin. Vinny was the type of drinker that 2 beers in would put him right back in the same place he was at the night before after 15 beers. He had a great big jolly belly laugh who had fun with everything on the planet. On top of that he was a good fisherman. We

never won the big tournament, but we were entered 2x and came out with some nice fishing gear.

This one particular time on the lake comes to mind. It was that picture-perfect Saturday morning setting at 6AM when we started out. Absolutely quiet, a peaceful mist rising up over the lake with the sun just starting to lighten the morning tree line that surrounded the entire lake. What a time to take a breath of fresh, clean, cool country air. The peace was only broken by the sound of 20 drinking fisherman stumbling into their boats and the woosh of popping beers. Yes – we had been drinking since we left NY on the 2-hour trip up, then thru the night. Some of us never made it to bed, but we were all there to fish, or whatever.

Vinny and I were primed after a few beers while we were setting up. We were ready: beer, fishing poles, tackle box and net. We had a favorite "hot "spot on the lake that took about another half beer to get to. A quiet little spot nestled under some tree overhang with just enough room to cast your line. We were alone, we were at peace, it was beautiful, so we toasted to a good day of fun and we cast our lines just under the brush into a corner of an area covered by blooming lily pads.

No sooner than Vinny's line hitting the water the silene and peace was broken when the lake erupted what seemed like a volcano blast. A fish had exploded out of the water after taking Vinny's lure, and it was big.

I say big since usually a 2-3 lb fish was usual out of the lake with 8.5lbs being the record. This one was up there, or at least made enough of an eruption to think so. Well, Vinny sets the hook, stands up in the boat to start reeling in this fish that has bent his pole in half and taking the tip into the water. He knows its big and starts to yell to me to "get the net". I'm trying to reel in my line and move out of his way, stumbling around the rocking boat, fishing equipment, the cooler and a few empty beer cans. While he's yelling "get the net" I'm yelling back "I'm looking for it" we went

back and forth 3-4-5 times "get the net!", I'm tryin!", "Get the net!!" "where the heck is it",!!! "Get the net!!! ". You get the picture. Well by this time Vinny reeled the fish in by the side of the boat and since I already had fallen over in the rocking boat I reached into the water and grabbed the fish by the mouth and pulled him in.

We were ecstatic, it was big!, high fivin', hootin' and hollerin' and laughing at our hysterics in catching 1 fish. We were looking around for anyone to show off to. It turned out to be a 6.6 lb largemouth trophy bass. Once we settled down and put the fish in the live well, and of course we decided to celebrate with a nice cold beer. I opened the cooler and there it was --- "the net!". Vinny and I had a great laugh about it then and still to the last days whenever we saw each other, our greeting was "get the net" a handshake and a laugh. Another forever moment made whenever – hard to believe but this one was made all before 7AM.

The Landscape Article May 2021 By the landscape guy

Get ready for the heat! June, July and August in Florida. WOW! All that coupled with a water restriction is enough to drive a garden into the ground. If you notice this is the May article and we are discussing June, July and August, there is a reason for that. What you do now will effect what is to come. Seems like we go from just remembering the cold 45-50 degree nights to the heat. Our comfortable cooler seasons seem to be getting shorter and shorter.

This is a wonderful time of the year when everything is starting to bloom, from shrubs to flowering trees to beautiful morning Glories. All those nice green and colorful plants need water to stay healthy. With the severe water restriction that will soon be in place by the CITY, we face another challenge. Just think how difficult it would be to get along and feel healthy by drinking only once a week. This is the strain the restrictions will put on our lawns and plants.

Fear not my fine friends! We have a month to prepare. The 80 ish daytime temps in May will give you to proper time to get your lawn and shrubs in good shape for the heat.

There is a cure, and it is built into your garden plants and shrubs, but they need your help.

Once again the action/reaction syndrome comes into place. Plants much like the human body will only take in what they need but unlike the human body plants do not discard that additional intake because they do not over indulge. If you over or under feed, over or under water, you will see the results all of which are bad.

If you read and did what the past articles said to do, in conjunction with the ongoing park program, with regard to your lawn, it will have developed a deep root system that will allow it to pick up and absorb those pockets of water deep (4–8 inches) down into the soil. Your lawn will have developed into a thick blanket, enough to block off some of the hot sun from drying up the soil. This coupled with a regular 4 ½ inch cut will allow your lawn to make it thru the summer months even with the watering restrictions.

You should already have down a sufficient amount (approx 4 inches) of mulch around your shrubs and (approx 2-3 inches) around your prize flowers, you will be able to hold a good amount of water in the soil that will not be dried up by the hot sun.

The month of May is also a great time to add additional nutrients (fertilizer) to the soil (FOR YOUR FLOWERS AND SHRUBS ONLY) for strength and color and protection to those critters and diseases that love the stresses that the summer months put on our garden. A simple 10-10-10 fertilizer will do the trick. Try not to be convinced to buy a fertilizer/pest control mix. I feel the pest control portion of the mixed bag is so minimal that it's a waste of money.

IMPORTANT NOTE: THE PARK FERTILIZATION SCHEDULE FOR TruGreen Pest CONTROL WILL ADD NUTRIENTS TO YOUR LAWNS throughout the summer months.

WATERING HABITS ARE CRITICAL. As stated in previous articles your lawn and shrubs will adjust to watering habits.

Water once for a longer period (45 or so minutes) as recommended and your lawn will learn to survive on less so the heat of summer will not stress or burn the top roots of your lawn as much. Additional hand watering may be necessary for some flowering plants that cannot take the summer heat.

<u>Tip of the month:</u> This is a very important step in choosing your landscape. Plants with the same watering habits, heat and cold tolerance in the same garden is another essential step in a stress-free healthy garden.

I cannot stress the point that enough that for a healthy lawn and plants you must put in some time and effort, and like anything else, if you pay attention on a regular basis it will become easier and easier to see the signs of a healthy, as well as, the beginnings of a stressed lawn and garden. It will also be less and less work to maintain as the seasons go on, but by no means is it a hands-off deal. You will soon notice what the proper fertilizers, along with the contributions of pesticide and disease control products will do, if applied before you notice signs of stress and infestation. (all discussed in previous articles)

If you have taken the advice from this and previous articles, along with the program provided by the park you should be at the start of a great and colorful season of gardening.






Candle Safety

- Candles are in sturdy fire-proof containers that won't be tipped over.
- $\ \square$ Adults blow out all candles when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Candles are kept out of reach from children and pets.

If you have children in your home, lock up any items that can start a fire (matches, lighters, cigarettes, etc.) and make sure children cannot reach candles


