

- -Dead and Hazardous Cedar Tree removed on Arcadia.


- -Quarterly Well Maintenance scheduled for August.

### **CARPORT CLUTTER**

Stonehedge Rules & Regulations state "Storage of items under or around the mobile home, or on carports, is not permitted. Only furniture, specifically designed for outside use, shall be used outside the mobile home."

This requires that Residents REMOVE ITEMS FROM THEIR CARPORT and from THE SIDES or BACK of the unit if they are NOT CONSISTENT WITH THE RULE. This includes items such as, but not limited to, Bikes, Ladders, Racks, Storage Totes, Household Appliances, Wood, Pavers, and the like. If it is NOT furniture "specifically designed for outdoor use" THANK YOU for REMOVING IT PROMPTLY.



Pets must be walked ON A LEASH and ONLY on the TWO STRIPS of Common Area along the east main entrance up to the Cody's Way sidewalk. This area is off limits before 7:30 AM and after 8:30 PM. Pets on Golf Carts should also be leashed and under the control of their handler.

Pets are NOT allowed in Common Areas, recreational areas, Clubhouse building, Streets (except to cross), or yard of other residents.

### A REFRESHER...

-Travel Trailers, Campers, Boats, including Canoes, are NOT permitted in driveways or at mobile home spaces except to LOAD and UNLOAD (overnight). If you need more time, a Unit Owner's RV and other vehicles may be parked only in the <u>designated area at the rear of Clubhouse</u> for a period NOT to exceed five (5) days in any 30-day period, with Unit ID in window.

- -Major Automotive or RV repairs by or for residents are not permitted on carports or within the park.
- -One "For Sale" sign, not to exceed 12" x 14" may be placed on the Home ONLY. No other signs or advertising materials will be permitted to be posted on the mobile home or mobile home space.
- -SPEEDING DRIVERS, including Golf Cart drivers: SLOW DOWN PLEASE! Observe the park's 15 MPH posted speed.
- -Lawn Watering between the DAYTIME hours of 8AM and 6PM is still PROHIBITED under the current drought restrictions.

# **Regarding Monthly Maintenance Fees**

- -The Monthly Maintenance Fee is due and payable by the THIRD day of each month.
- -A PAYMENT is <u>LATE when it is postmarked</u>
  <u>AFTER THE 5<sup>TH</sup> (FIFTH) DAY OF THE MONTH</u>
  (or received electronically after the 5<sup>th</sup> day of the month).
- -A \$25 Delinquent Fee plus Interest Charges apply to LATE PAYMENTS.

IT IS IMPORTANT TO BE MINDFUL OF THE ABOVE INFORMATION AND SCHEDULE YOUR MONTHLY PAYMENT ACCORDINGLY TO AVOID LATE FEES AND INTEREST CHARGES.

If you mail a check or use online banking to make a payment, if it is received with a postmark later than the FIFTH DAY of the month, or electronically received AFTER the FIFTH DAY of the month, a \$25 DELINQUENT FEE AND INTEREST CHARGE IS APPLIED.

In some cases, these fees are being incurred EACH MONTH <u>because PAYMENTS ARE REPEATEDLY RECEIVED LATE.</u> I'm providing this information again this month to help residents avoid this issue in the future.

### What can you do?

- -Contact the Office to check the status of your account and to learn whether you have incurred Delinquent Fees and Interest Charges due to LATE PAYMENTS.
- -If you receive a letter and/or account statement showing a balance owed for Delinquent Fees and Interest Charges, pay it promptly to avoid further charges.
- -Enroll in Autopay. Payments are debited from designated accounts on the THIRD of the MONTH.
- -Mail/Schedule payments with enough time to be RECEIVED BY TRUIST BANK IN ORLANDO BY THE DUE DATE: the THIRD DAY of the MONTH.



### **CRUISING WITH THE DUNSTALLS**

After almost four years of waiting, we are back cruising! Our 35 day adventure begins!

We quickly found our favourite locations and activities on board the ship, and within 24 hours were more or less oriented. The stateroom nicely meets all our expectations! Along the way we noticed a few changes/ cutbacks on board. No longer is almost every nook and cranny filled with fresh flowers that kept one employee working full time. No computer classes, cooking classes and demos, fewer locations with live music for listening and dancing-at least not at the hours we are prepared to stay up to!! Also missing is the lecture series with professionals doing the presenting. Still far too many activities offered to be able to do it all!! Still lots of good food in many locations and lots of variety!

After sailing from Boston, the ship made its first stop at Bar Harbor, Maine. For our excursion through Acadia National Park we had a very informative guide. I will give you just the highlights, but skip this next paragraph if the park does not interest you.

The first inhabitants of the area were indigenous peoples, of whom one group remains. That group still looks at Cadillac Mountain as a spiritual place. Cadillac Mountain is the U.S. location from which the sunrise can first be seen each day! The park on Mount Desert Island is made up of donated land with small parcels throughout of land still privately owned. Two of the well-known people here who's homes we saw from a distance are Martha Stewart and Dick Wolf (producer of TV shows). In 1947, a forest fire destroyed about 1/3 of the island including a lot of the summer "cottages" of the rich and famous. That scorched land is now covered with deciduous trees and thick vegetation, giving beautiful fall foliage. The portion not burned still has the original coniferous growth. The granite was formed from volcanic lava, active about 400 million years ago, and is a somewhat rare pink

colour. Within the park there are carriage roads developed and mostly financed by John D. Rockefeller Jr., a big benefactor of this park and strongly influential in its growth and development. To this day, the National Park directors adhere to his vision of a roadway for non motorized vehicles, such as bicycles, horses and horse drawn carriages and buggies. Class one e-bikes are allowed. We were told that this park is the only U.S. national park with carriage roads. On this tour, the stops along the way provided opportunities to view the beautiful seascapes, the ponds, lakes, beaver lodge and dam, as well as the wildflowers. Cadillac was a stowaway on one of the European ships and the decision was made to keep him rather than follow the usual process of throwing stowaways overboard. After being trained in sailing and exploring, he stayed in this area for a while. Later he traveled and explored westward, founding the city of Detroit, or so we were told. The auto company named its luxury car after him and the logo still used on the front and back are the "Family Crest" that Cadillac drew on the ship he came on! Or, so we were told!

"Whale activity! Starboard side!" Of course we all rushed to the right side of the ship. Lo and behold we saw it! In the distance you could see intermittent waterspouts!!

Next port, Sydney, Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia. Once a bustling city focused on coal mining, steel production, and ship building, Sydney has worked hard to develop other ways to try to reduce/ prevent the brain drain to other parts of Canada. The island is separated from the rest of Nova Scotia by the Canso Strait. This body of water is very significant for the ships traveling between Europe and the Suez Canal to Canada and the mouth of the St. Lawrence River. To maintain a flow of resources and people between the two pieces of land and still accommodate ships, the causeway built includes rail line, traffic lanes for vehicles, and a swing

bridge to turn and allow ships through the canal. All accomplished with the efforts of mindful community members!

Corner Brook, Newfoundland is our first real connection to the name of our cruise-Voyage of the Vikings. The colony of 100 to 160 settled in the far north of Newfoundland in the 11th century and lasted for about 100 years. It was the earliest European settlement in North America, pre 1492. The Norse society placed a high value on wine, using it for festive and for religious occasions. The wild grapes found on the location of this first settlement were also found in northern New Brunswick, leading to speculation that the Vikings may have travelled to that area as well. Newfoundland is the only place in North America where armed Germans were a known presence in World War Two. Prior to the 1950's the airport in Gander, Newfoundland was the busiest airport on the world. Prior to the development of jet planes, overseas flights to this part of the world all stopped in Gander for refueling. It was the closest airport to Europe and to Dubai.

As tourists, we were treated to some typical scenery on the sail-in this morning, with low mountain backdrops for villages and farms along the coast. The picture is of this morning's sunrise. The scenery was very reminiscent of some of the areas along the coasts of South Pacific Islands, the coastlines of some South American countries, and even some of the lake areas of northern Ontario. In town, we saw a Newfoundland dog, as big as a bear cub, prominently displayed numbers on each of the many fire hydrants, a local brewing company, and evidence of both fishing and pulp and paper industries. I was fascinated with the smooth operation of the dock activity alongside the ship. The crane moves the container to what turns out to be the pick up point. The truck arrives and the container on it is unloaded. The truck moves forward to the first container. The crane loads it onto the truck. The truck departs. All in a matter

of minutes. The parks within the town and the dock area are all very well maintained, clean, and appear to be very safe!

This cruise is our twelfth (not a record by any means) in the past eighteen years, with each offering opportunities to have bridge lessons and to play bridge. Yesterday was the first we played!! We have heard negative things about the instructor so have not even considered that! However, for a couple of hours yesterday we joined the social bridge, met a very nice couple who play our way, and we got along very well. May tempt fate and give it a try again today. Update, a few hours later: Not only did we play but we agreed to meet and play at 10:00 tomorrow morning with the two who played with us!! A day at sea tomorrow.

The picture inserted is the Newfoundland dog that greeted us. Note the size of the person's foot, below the sign. That is a big dog! The webbed paws make for an excellent swimmer and a good breed for water rescue.
